It is hard to believe it is already time for the September Gleaner to come out. There are so many things I had hoped to accomplish this summer that are not yet done. Some of them may still be finished, others will not. I am reminded a bit of David and his desire to build a house for the Lord. The Lord sent word to him that he would not be the one to build it. With a working draft they considered a vision of what this would look like. The mission statement and vision statement and vision statement were adopted at the last Ad Council meeting. It is now up to the leaders and congregation to make the vision come to fruition. Each church will have an opportunity to do this.

When I look back, maybe I have accomplished what needs to be accomplished for now. It's time to look forward, to the future, both short term and long term.

#### Fall 2018 Listening Sessions for General Conference 2019

Why is there a special General Conference coming February 23 – 26, 2019 in St. Louis, MO only a year before the regularly scheduled 2020 session in Minneapolis? How might my church be affected by this talk about choosing among a One Church, Connectional Conference and Traditionalist plan? Will other possibilities emerge? Change is coming for The United Methodist Church and there will be meetings this fall to help Wisconsin UMs understand what is being proposed. Formed following authorization by General Conference 2016, the Commission on a Way Forward identified three possible options, or plans, for our denomination as we move into the future. The Council of Bishops has recommended adoption of the One Church plan. The Wisconsin Delegation to GC 2019 is hosting nine educational and listening sessions around the state to allow feedback about the proposals. These sessions for interested clergy and laity will each last between 60-90 minutes. The dates and locations near us are:

Sunday, September 30, 3:00 pm, Webster Grace UMC, 25603 Muskey Ave. Monday, October 1, 7 pm, Eau Claire Lake Street UMC, 337 Lake Street.

In addition, invitations have been extended to Conference boards, agencies and other groups to provide their feedback to Delegation members. The purpose of all this information gathering is for the Delegation to hear from the diversity of membership which makes up Wisconsin United Methodism. The desire is to better understand thinking and feeling within our annual conference about our denomination's future.



#### GIVING Spiritual Maturity in Stewardship September 2018

I could not speak to you as spiritual people, but rather as people of the flesh, as infants in Christ. I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for solid food. Even now you are still not ready... (1 Corinthians 3:1–2)

The goal of discipleship is spiritual maturity. As Scripture tells us in Hebrews 6:1, "Therefore let us go on toward perfection, leaving behind the basic teaching about Christ, and not laying again the foundation". The aim of mature spirituality is to have the same mindset as Christ Jesus, but usually comes in stages of commitment whether it be prayer, presence, service, witness, or giving.

Previously, we identified four stages of giving. In Stage 1, people spend on themselves and give to God from what is left over. They usually give little or nothing. They are not ready to commit.

In Stage 2, people take responsibility and wonder what equal shares of the goal (e.g., church budget) are. Of course, this fails to recognize that households have different levels of resources. People at this stage are ready to give regularly and many of commit to pledging.

In Stage 3, people want to put God first in their lives, even if they must change spending habits and attitudes toward having things. They understand that an offering to God is intended to be a sacrifice. They look to move toward tithing, giving ten percent of their income to God, by increasing the percentage of income they give each year.

In Stage 4, people want to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. They see even what they spend on their own needs to be support for their discipleship. Often, their giving to church substantially exceeds the 10 percent tithing mark. Where are you in your discipleship journey? Is this the year, you make a change? Let's pray for one another as we grow together.
