We have asked the Mission Superintendent to send a United Methodist pastor to Limón to found a UM church here and to help with, then finally, accept responsibility for the small orphanage run by our aging friend, Sor Leonarda. Unfortunately, her failing memory limits her energetic body and her mission. Sor is very pleased with the possibility, asking when that person could come. She has had some experience with adult men trying to seduce her girls, so really wants a woman pastor—or a married man. She loves these kids and wants them safe.

The Superintendent answered immediately and was very pleased with the idea. He will be meeting with Bishop Elías Galvan in December to discuss many issues. He has put Limón on the agenda.

Please pray that God's will prevail in this issue. We see through a glass darkly, but one day will see face to face. In the meantime, we try to follow God's will and try to become better and better at discerning that will. Sister Confianza and I try very hard to support Honduran projects, not start our own. There are enough ugly Americans to go around. The things I've seen are not always the news fit to print.

The Annual Meeting of the United Methodist Mission is in the first half of January (when appointments are officially announced). Until then, pray without ceasing. I'll keep you posted.

Help the Homeless Fundraiser

Help the Homeless fundraiser has a goal is to stop homelessness in our community. We are holding a fundraiser to help with the cost of getting into housing, to help get our homeless be safe and warm. Wisconsin winters are hard on everyone, but to live outside or in your car can be life threatening.

Homelessness is an epidemic that is happening across our country. Visibly we see the homeless on the street seeking shelters, but it is much more than that. There are many "homeless" who are living with others or in their cars or in extremely poor conditions. Many more are on the verge of being homeless. According to the Dunn County Health Department's 2017 report, 14.2% of Dunn County residents live with an income less than the poverty level, with child poverty levels at 15%. A job loss or illness can be a calamity that finds a person homeless.

The second challenge is to find affordable housing. Most places require a deposit (usually 1 month's rent), first month and last month's rent before you can move in. Average rates for a 2-bedroom apartment range from \$450-\$900 with homes for families being much more. Adding the deposit and last month's rent to that is an impossibility for most people. A lucky few, can lean on family and friends to help, if they have that resource, but struggle to pay them back.

Boyceville is a small town with a big goal, to raise \$10,000 to help with homeless housing. We believe that if we work as one with area churches, businesses, and community we can make a big impact toward this goal.
