Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It's hard to believe that we are so close to the end of a calendar year. Of course, we have already begun a new Christian calendar year. Many of us will soon be thinking of changes we would like to make in our lives in this New Year. Unfortunately, it seems that about 80% of resolutions made fail by February with only about 8-9 % success rate. There are many reasons for this failure rate. One of them is that most people live in a safe comfort zone. The comfort zone is embedded in our subconscious. Even if we say we desire change, the comfort zone remains in our subconscious mind.

Unfortunately, when creating our New Year's resolutions, many of us create a long list of things to change or something unrealistic for the time we allow ourselves and that sets us up for failure as our safe comfort zone resets itself.

Making only a small change in your daily routine will help avoid the resistance that naturally comes with change. It takes about 66 days to break an old habit. It takes time and patience to change and it doesn't happen without effort.

As I have thought about this it reminded me of this verse found in Matthew, Mark, and Luke. "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." Although Jesus said this after speaking to a rich young man, it could be said of any of us when we desire to change something for something better. It can also be true during times of expected change. Even when we know change is going to happen, we are taken out of our safe comfort zone.

This happens with pastoral change as well. Pastors and congregations grow to know and care about each other. They become comfortable with each other's unique ways.

Although I have been here a little over a year now and have tried not to change too many things, there are changes that naturally happen as each pastor comes with different gifts and different family configurations. This change has been harder on some of you than others as we have been learning about each other. It is also complicated when there is more than one location, each with its own personality and needs. With time and patience, we will come to know each other better as we travel on this journey together.

Dear Friends at Boyceville,

Thank you for your commitment to provide \$100 a month to support our work at the Public Health Clinic in Limón, Honduras. We have received the first installment which exceeded your pledge, and are so appreciative. You are the first congregation to make a monthly commitment, and it makes a real difference.

We pay nurse Keysy about \$9 a day to work with Sister Alegría (Beth Blodgett) in the clinic each week, so that patients will be seen, even if Sister Alegría is not up to full strength. In fact, Keysy sees patients every Tuesday and often Wednesdays as well, whether or not we make it in. (We only go when there is a ride down from the monastery in La Fortuna). Your donation more than guarantees Keysy's wages each month.

Thank you for doing God's work and helping make health care available to this rural population.

GIVING Invitation January 2019

"Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. (Matthew 7:7-8)

Henri Nouwen has said, "Asking people for money is giving them the opportunity to put their resources at the disposal of the Kingdom." If God wants us to build the Kingdom of God, then he wants us to invite others to support it. This is evangelism because the good news is that God has faith in us to build the Kingdom. There are a number of steps in the asking process and asking is a later step, not the first:

Ask God First! We must first trust in God that we can succeed in soliciting support for the missions and ministries we seek to support. We come to God in prayer to ask God for support before asking anyone else.

Love the person you are asking. We must also love the person we are asking for support, giving them the means to become a brother or sister in Christ through their support of the Kingdom. We must trust that the Spirit of Christ that is guiding us is also guiding them.

Ask on behalf of the Kingdom of God. We are asking potential donors to invest in the work of God. Whether their ability to give is great or small, what matters is that they are making their gift available to God.

Be grateful for the answer. Whether the answer is yes or no or maybe or someday, we must be grateful that the person listened and gave us an honest answer. We have offered something of great value and that is what is important to us.
