Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I learned from the news last night that we have now broken the record for the most snowfall in February. It was also reported that we are in tenth place for the largest snowfall in one month, with the possibility of breaking that record.

I seemed to remember writing something about snow last winter as well and found that I wrote this for the February newsletter in 2018: I write this as everyone is digging out from under the most snow we have had since December of 2010 when the weight of the snow brought down the Metrodome roof in Minneapolis.

We like to break records. If we didn't there wouldn't be the Guinness Book of Records. Breaking records can bring excitement, joy into our lives and in some cases; it can be fun to do. But some, I'm not sure we need to break. As I talk to people, read posts on Facebook, watch news reports, it's evident that many people are just as weary as I am from the amount of snow we have had in a short time.

I found myself remembering Jesus saying something about how long must I. In all three of the synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) Jesus says: "You unbelieving and perverse generation," Jesus replied, "how long shall I stay with you and put up with you? (Lk 9:41 NIV)

Jesus had been preaching, teaching, and demonstrating what his followers needed to learn but they just didn't seem to get it. It seems he became weary as well. Although he became weary, he didn't quite, give up. He regrouped and continued as he made his way to the cross, not for his benefit, for ours.

As we continue to dig out from the latest snowfall, remember these words of the Hymn of Promise

In the bulb there is a flower; in the seed, an apple tree; in cocoons, a hidden promise: butterflies will soon be free! In the cold and snow of winter there's a spring that waits to be, unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see. Seeking God's Will in St. Louis

A historic gathering will take place February 23-26 in St. Louis, Missouri as the specially convened session of General Conference takes place. This meeting will shape and direct the future of The United Methodist Church. It is a monumental moment in our long and varied history. It is my fervent prayer and deepest hope that it will be a God moment.

What we will do in St. Louis is incredibly important. It will say to the world who we are, what we value, how we understand the God of love, and why we believe the church is important. It will determine how we will live together in covenant, and the foundation upon which our covenant is based. It will impact how we treat each other, and what the core of our ministry is in our broken, contentious, and conflicted world. This conference will determine whether we can continue to serve God as the body of Christ or if we will have to go our separate ways. And while it will not settle our different understandings of the authority and interpretation of scripture, our theological debates, and our ideological disagreements, it will influence how we will be able to engage in these issues in the days to come.

As important as <u>what</u> we do, then, is <u>how</u> we do what we do. The world is watching us. How will Christians behave when they discuss, debate, dialogue, and disagree about the critical decisions that must be made? How will disciples of Jesus the Christ speak to one another? Will the Holy Spirit have anything to do with our deliberations? If so, then the evidence will be a General Conference abounding in the fruit of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. These will be the determining proof of who is in charge of General Conference 2019. "Winning" is not the point. Honoring and glorifying God, modeling Christian grace and mercy, embracing a Pentecostal infusion of Holy Spirit – this will proclaim to the world our core beliefs and values.

February 23 has been designated a day of prayer and discernment for this special General Conference. I want to invite all clergy and laity throughout our Annual Conference to hold this Saturday as a true Sabbath. Set aside time, energy, and focus to pray simply, but powerfully, "not our will be done, O Lord, but in all things may your will be done!"

There is still so much critical ministry for us to do. We still exist in a world of hurt and violence, untruth and hatred, brokenness and despair. And we United Methodists have been blessed with the gospel, the good news that God is still in charge. Our God is love. Our God is grace. Our God is compassion and mercy. Our God loves the entire creation. And God loves all of us so much that God's Son came to redeem and reclaim us all. Let us do nothing, through our human weakness or short-sightedness, to undermine the will and work of God. Let us pray together to be faithful in all things. I believe God has great plans for us that echoes the prophet's promise, a future with hope.

GIVING Why Do I Give? March 2019

"The wicked borrow and do not repay, but the righteous give generously." (2 Psalm 37:21)

People give to the church for a variety of reasons that form a hierarchy of motivations. Where they fall on the hierarchy is related closely to how much, proportionately, they give; how willingly they give; how they respond to being asked to pledge their support to the mission and ministry of the church, and how openly they talk about their giving. What motivates you to give?

Some people feel **called** to give out of their faith. Giving generously feels right and natural. It is a part of their discipleship. In turn, they are grateful for their own blessings including a place in the church where they can contribute.

Some people feel **fulfilled** by giving. They derive joy, energy and good feelings from giving. They value the church in their lives and want to support it so it is there for others.

Some people **value** giving as a duty. It is the right thing to do and creates good in the world. Giving influences the community for good and connects the giver with the community.

Some people would feel **guilty** if they did not give. They feel giving is something they should do, even if they would rather not. Alternatively, that fear they will be shamed if they do not give.

Finally, some people feel **coerced.** They feel their situation compels them to give.
