Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As I write to you today, I have just come back from three days of training at Green Lake Conference Center. Lent seems a strange time to pull clergy away from the church to gather in training but as we gathered to hear our lecturer, breaking for lunch and dinner (there were sessions after dinner as well), I was slowly convinced it might not be so strange at that.

I believe this winter has been a trying one on so many levels for everyone. In a way, because of the many challenges we faced, our focus on God and the tasks Jesus has given us, though not forgotten, was drawn elsewhere. Clergy coming together for this length of time during this season drew us from the added tasks of the season, but, gave us time to refocus after a trying winter season.

As we continue our journey of lent, I want to encourage everyone to remember the membership vow to be present. Present to other, present in worship. We have some exciting things coming up. Palms for Palm/Passion Sunday; Maundy Thursday Seder at Boyceville (a charge worship event); Good Friday Tenebrae ecumenical service at Prairie Farm: Faith; and our Easter celebration of the risen Christ.

I want to particularly say something about the Seder. There are some that say if we hold a Seder, we are co-opting the practices of another religious group for our own purposes. I always wondered about this until I read a book called *What Every Christian Needs to Know About Passover: What It Means and Why It Matters* by Rabbi Evan Moffic. As a child I often wondered why we used the Old Testament but then said these celebrations did not belong to us.

In his introduction he calls Passover an “interesting place where Christianity and Judaism intersect.” He says: “Church going Christians celebrate Jesus’ Passover Seder when they take communion.” At the end of his book he gives a Seder for Christians. I purposely say a Seder because there are many different versions of the celebration but all with the central purpose of remembering the Passover and God delivering the Israelites out of slavery from Egypt.

I believe with some of the things that have been happening in our country and around the world, exploring this intersection on Maundy Thursday through the Seder meal may help us better understand our Jewish cousins.

We are asking for you to sign up, AKA, let us know you will be coming, one week before. This will help those preparing the meal know how much they should prepare.

Grace and peace on your continued Lenten Journey.

Honduras Mission Updates

3/5/2019

Thank you for your faithful financial help. The last week in February, we visited La Ceiba, including visiting our collaborator, Eloyda Ponce, R. N., who orders medicines for us for the public health clinic in Limón. This time we ordered only boxes of syringes and acetamenophen—a light order, less than \$180. When we run out of syringes and a patient has an injection prescribed, said patient must go to a local store and buy a syringe, then return for the injection. It's not supposed to be that way, so the monastery tries to keep the clinic in syringes when the government fails. Also, we bought 4,000 tablets of acetamenophen. There are at least 20 health volunteers in various neighborhoods. 20 years ago, malaria was quite a scourge here. The public health department has worked hard to make it rare. In our county, we had no cases in 2018, thanks mostly to our tireless supervisor of "health promoters," Eric Cooper. He asked us to resupply the acetamenophen supply. In years past, patients went for their malaria test and received three days of malaria treatment. Now that malaria is less common, the government, in their wisdom, decided to stop giving out malaria medicine. But your ordinary citizen is not going to walk ½ mile to have a malaria test done without receiving any medicine. The monastery provides the acetamenophen so that this important screening for malaria can continue to be effective. It is effective.

What can a small, all-white church in a white community do to roll back racism? LOTS. In Wisconsin, all newborns are screened at the cost of the state for many potentially disabling conditions, including sickle-cell anemia, which is more common among African heritage people. Honduras has no such free testing. We have been able to obtain reliable sickle cell tests for \$4 each. \$4—that's a lot. We buy pregnancy tests for 75 cents each. Thanks to donors, this year our Garifuna (Afro-Caribe) children will be tested for sickle cell disease, carrier status, and Hemoglobin C. If we know a baby has sickle cell disease (which protects against malaria—that's why it has survived), that baby will suffer much less throughout her life and will receive appropriate treatment when needed. Sickle cell puts one at risk of debilitating pain episodes (the red cells sludge in the tiny blood vessels) and overwhelming infection (the spleen dies of overwork recycling the sickle-shaped red cells). We spent \$1,642 in January to buy just over a one-year supply of these tests. We'll carefully record the results so that even if we can never do it again, we'll have lots of data of family histories.

The tests have been finally shipped (March 14) so soon we'll be in business.
